Albania has leapt forward more than a century in the last 20 years. I was delighted to see Eco-bikes in Tirana!

When I got there I was amazed to find that in a country with a population of only 3 million, there were 27 music schools, a Conservatoire, an Opera Company, a Ballet Company and seven symphony orchestras. The standard of performance and scholarship was extremely high.

By various means I managed to get invited back to find out more. I did some BBC broadcasts and wrote a book about what I had found.

When the communist regime fell in 1991 there was chaos for a while, and musical life came to a stop. This seemed such a terrible loss that, together with a couple of friends, I founded The Albanian Musicians' Trust. We did as much as we could to help students and professional musicians over the next 15 years until the country had found its feet. The Trust was wound up in 2006 with a concert in Helmsley, given by two of Albanian musicians.

I visited most years from 1988 onwards to see friends and make notes of requests and needs, and last visited in 2002. I've kept in touch with key people and this year I couldn't bear it any longer and went back for a week. It was wonderful to meet up with all the old gang – much hugging, cups of lethal coffee and exotic meals.

I knew they were cooking something up, but wasn't prepared for the ceremony at the University of Arts on Monday 5th November. About 50 of my musician friends turned up and I was given a beautifully inscribed document and a sort of 'Oscar' in recognition of services to Albanian music. I was completely bowled over. Apparently they've given this award before, but never to a foreigner.

A little about allotments...

There I was, a fairly merry widow with nice tidy warm indoor hobbies, when I met Husband No 2. His hobbies were much more earthy. When he came to live with me in Kirkbymoorside, giving up his house and (more importantly) garden, the arrangement included taking on an allotment, which we would share, and he would teach me to be a constant gardener. Fine, I thought, picturing myself in a floaty frock and big straw hat, with a trug over my arm, picking beans for dinner in the late afternoon sunshine. How hard can it be?

The answer is very. Or sometimes very very. There are days when the north wind howls down the Gillamoor Road, the plot has more mud than the Hippopotamus song, and none of it is glorious. Your fingers and toes freeze, of course, but so do bits of you that you didn't know could freeze. Your Christmas dinner is buried under the snow, the frost has decimated your tender greens, and even the workhouse cat stays indoors. I'm not sure if these days are better or worse than the ones where you are hot and sweaty, covered in dust, and eaten by flying creatures with a two foot wingspan and jaws to match, while your tender greens wilt for lack of water. In between there are long periods of back breaking planting and weeding, hoeing and fertilising, mowing and chopping, and building cages to protect your tender greens from slugs, snails, caterpillars, mice, rabbits and pigeons, not to mention black fly, green fly and (for all I know) purple striped fly. The floaty frock is still in the wardrobe

So why am I still doing it, several years on?? Bizarrely, I enjoy it! It's a more interesting form of exercise than going to the gym, and cheaper too. Why weeding should be more satisfying than hoovering I don't understand, but it is. You know where your food has come from, what nasties have (or haven't) been sprayed on it, and how long it is since it left the ground, bush or tree. And it *tastes*! No more of those Dutch tomatoes that look lovely but are just bags of water, no more pretty pink carrots that don't flavour a cake, no more frozen peas. Is that what celery really tastes like? Worth a few broken finger nails.

If you feel like giving it a go, the annual rental is only £20.00 and although there is a waiting list at the moment, there is regular turnover. First solar panels

Our first solar panels are already generating electricity on the roof of The Green Building, owned by KMS Pre-school and Kids Club, who will get some free day-time electricity. The Government Feed in Tarrif (FITS) will be used to pay the local investors who paid for these panels at 3-4% per year. The Directors are volunteers and the aims are to increase the energy independence for Kirkbymoorside and district, to increase access to free day time electricity, to make available a modest local investment opportunity, and to reduce the carbon footprint of the town. We would like more potential investors and more potential roofs.

Old Library

At the end of March 2013 Rvedale District Council staff will no longer be working in the Library on Wednesdays. Volunteers are needed so that we can continue to open the library for 5 days a week. If you have 2 to 3 hours a month to spare and would like to become a library volunteer then please give your name and contact details to a member of staff at the library, the Town Council Office or telephone or email the Town Clerk.

Town Guide

A new Town Guide will be available soon with details of public services in the town and other useful information. There will be a link to the publication on the Council website and copies will be available free of charge from the Library and the Town Council Office. Refurbishment work at the old library has taken much longer than expected but the building will be available for use in the New Year. We hope that it will become a useful space for as many local groups as possible. The Council has agreed that it may be used free of charge for six months. Community Award

Each year the council makes an annual award to a Kirkbymoorside citizen who has made an outstanding contribution to the community. Nominations forms are available from the office or Library. The closing date is 31 January 2013.

Grants

The Council has a grant fund and can award money to projects that benefit the town. For more information and an application form, please visit the Council website, the office or ask at the Library.

Budget 2013/14

The Council continues to prioritise those areas that givedirect benefit

to the town, and is increasing its budget for grants to local groups from £9000 to £10,000.More money will be available to maintain the old library as it comes into use for community purposes. Other services are being maintained or slightly increased, while overhead costs continue to be scrutinised. The overall tax charge will be reduced by £500 next year, to make 3 vears of continual reductions.
